



Planting & Caring for Raspberries

Planting raspberries in full sun with good drainage and air circulation is very important. Raspberries have perennial crowns and roots, however the canes only last two summers. The new canes are called "primocanes." The following summer, primocanes turn into "floricanes." Primocanes only produce foliage where the floricanes produce berries. Primocanes are produced annually. Prune floricanes in early spring or fall along with any dead branches.

Plant raspberry plants 2-3 feet apart from one another and space rows approximately 6 feet apart.

Raspberries



Anne Yellow -

Raspberries ripen in August to late September. Anne yellow is a large, firm, golden raspberry with a mild flavor. The plant has sparsely thorned canes with the fruit forming at the top.

Zone 4-10

Autumn Britten -

Raspberries ripen in early September. The berries are bright red, long, pointed, with very good flavor and firmness. The Autumn Britten plant is known for being vigorous, upright growth and a good producer.

Zone 4-7

Boyne -

Raspberries ripen in mid to late July. A red berry with medium acid and aromatic flavor. The sturdy, vigorous plant is known for being very hardy and prolific.

Zone 3-8

Bristol Black -

Raspberries ripen in late July. Bristol Black is a large, attractive black raspberry with a firm flesh. The berries have good flavor with excellent quality which makes them great for canning and freezing. The plant has very hardy and vigorous canes.

Zone 4-8

Caroline -

Raspberries ripen in late June and early September. Caroline is proven to be one of the most productive varieties, producing large, red and very flavorful berries. The vigorous plant has more leaf coverage protecting the berries from sun damage.

Zone 4-7

Heritage -

Raspberries ripen in mid-July and early September. The red berries are medium size with great flavor and quality.

Zone 4-8

Latham -

Raspberries ripen in late June, early July. The red raspberry is a sure cropper that ripens over a long period of time.

Zone 4-7

Loganberry -

Berries that ripen in July and September. Loganberry is a cross between a red raspberry and blackberry. The plant is known for its large, dark red berries and thorn less canes.

Royalty -

Raspberries ripen in late July. Royalty is a cross between a purple and red raspberry. The large, red fruit has great quality and a light sweet flavor. The vigorous plant is insect resistant and has few suckers.

Zone 4-7

Souris -

Raspberries ripen in July. Souris is an improved red raspberry similar to "Boyne," but slightly sweeter and more productive.

Zone 3-7
