Strawberry Pretzel Dessert

Crust:

- 2 cups crushed pretzels
- 3/4 cup butter, melted
- 3 tablespoons sugar

Filling:

- · 8 ounce cream cheese, softened
- 8 ounce whipped topping
- 1 cup white sugar

Topping:

- · 3 ounce strawberry flavored Jell-O
- 2 cups boiling water
- 10 ounce fresh strawberries, sliced

Directions:

Pre heat oven to 350°. Mix together pretzels, sugar and melted butter. Press mixture into the bottom of a 9x13 pan. Bake for 10 minutes and let cool completely. In a medium bowl beat sugar and cream cheese until smooth. Fold in whip topping and mix well to combine. Spread over cooled pretzel crust. Refrigerate for 30 minutes. In a medium bowl stir strawberry gelatin and boiling water. Mix in strawberries and refrigerate 5 minutes. Pour over cooled cream cheese layer. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour.

Types of Strawberries

Everbearing -

Strawberries that produce all summer long, Produces a spring crop and continues to bear berries throughout the growing season. Great for freezing, preserves, or fresh.

Junebearing -

Strawberries that produce one large crop in June. Great for eating, canning and freezing

Varieties

All Star -


Junebearing
An excellent flavored strawberry.
The plant is resistant to verticillium disease. The entire crop ripens in June, mid to late season.
Zone 4-10

Honeoye -

Junebearing
Strawberries with good flavor and
texture. The entire crop ripens in
June, early to mid-season. Great for
making pies, jam, and eating fresh.
Zone 3-10

Fort Laramie -

Everbearing
Large, scarlet strawberries with a
honeysweet flavor and a firm texture.
Plant produces berries summer
through fall. A great berry for
freezing, preserves, or eating fresh.
Zone 3-10



Planting Strawberries

Plant single strawberry plants in rows spacing plants approximately 8 to 14 inches apart. If planting more than one row of strawberries, space the rows approximately 24 inches apart from one another. The strawberry plant should be planted in the ground evenly with the crown of the strawberry plant. The crown of the plant is the area between the roots and stems. Strawberry plants often take one to two years to bear fruit.

Strawberries are commonly planted in the ground, raised beds or containers.
